We call on the next government to commit to working with the forestry profession to unlock the potential of our trees, woods and forests, in support of delivering against the timber, biodiversity, and climate crises.

We therefore seek to work with government to:

CHAMPION A STATE OF THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPER

Champion the critical role that trees, woodlands and forests play in delivering multiple economic, environmental and social benefits to the UK. The provision of equitable grants and funding will provide adequate support for the management of existing - and creation of additional - trees, woodlands and forests within the context of wider land-use policy. This in turn will see those numerous benefits realised, including meeting net zero targets and a thriving timber industry in the UK.

PRIORITISE

Prioritise the education, training and development of those working with trees at a technical and professional level. Develop consistent messaging around professionalism and competence. Continue supporting vital skills development, short courses, apprenticeships, higher education and research to enable the next generation to care for and make the most of our trees, woods and forests.

PROMOTE

Promote professionalism. The long-term benefits of trees in the urban and rural environments will only be seen if trees, woodlands and forests are planted and managed by qualified, professional foresters, arboriculturists and environmentalists. Forestry in all its forms requires long-term planning and future vision, underpinned by specialist research, to see lasting environmental, social and economic benefits.



Invest for a lasting impact. In particular to ensure the long-term resilience and survival of Britain's trees, woods and forests by focusing on nursery capacity and research into tree breeding, pest and disease development and the implications of a changing climate, allowing the forestry and affiliate sectors in the UK to work towards the common goal of achieving net zero and meet our ambitious environmental targets.
